Adaptive teaching

Joanna Di Bella

The session will be focussed on ordinarily available provision for pupils with SEN/D. There will be a focus on practical solutions which can be used across the curriculum to ensure that reasonable adjustments don't result in unreasonable workload. There may be some opportunities to talk about the challenges of increasingly complex needs and find ways to meet these needs.

AI in Schools: Hype or Helping Hand?

The amount of information, tools, news headlines and worries about AI can be overwhelming. As school leaders, where do you start in embracing the positives that AI can bring, whilst balancing the concerns? We will also discuss the concerns and what OFSTED expect. You will leave with suggestions for practical actions to take back to school, to help you on your AI journey.

Assessing learning in foundation subjects: checking we're moving through the planned curriculum together

Weaving the curriculum together: making purposeful links across a well-planned curriculum

Subjects tend not to sit in complete isolation: Learning in one area will often lean on learning from another. For example, when we look at Ancient Greece from a history perspective, we might draw on our geographical knowledge of the place. We want subjects to have integrity and for learning to build over time, and so we might want to think carefully about which links within and across subjects are helpful, and support pupils to build schema by making connections. This workshop will look at where learning in one curriculum area can support, build on or reinforce learning in another curriculum area. How do we make meaningful links that reinforce learning and build on it (in a spiral curriculum), whilst avoiding less helpful simple 'repetition'.

Wellbeing: The reality of being a headteacher
