A deep dive into deepfakes that demean, defraud and disinform - Ofcom

New Ofcom research, published in July 2024 reveals the prevalence of online deepfakes, we look at what can be done to tackle those that cause harm.

- Two in five people say they have seen at least one deepfake in the last six months including depictions of sexual content, politicians, and scam adverts
- Only one in ten are confident in their ability to spot them
- Ofcom sets out what tech firms can do to tackle harmful deepfakes
